



Monthly Workshop Series: Metacognition

Workshop Summary

In an educational context, “metacognition” refers to an awareness of one’s own learning preferences, study habits, strengths, and weaknesses. Despite the considerable amount of education that students have received by the time they take online courses, the unfortunate truth is that most of us aren’t taught how to learn. Given the various competing demands faced by typical online students – primarily jobs and families – students should be aware of research and strategies that can maximize their learning potential. Similarly, online instructors should be aware of approaches they can incorporate into their teaching that promote a metacognitive perspective. Including explicit opportunities in your course for students to reflect on their progress, articulate areas of struggle, and identify the broader context of what they’re learning can serve to enhance students’ motivation and maybe even improve retention.

Recommended Reading

In one sense, metacognition can be viewed as a way to make the invisible visible. [“Ensuring Students are Thinking and Understanding in the Online Classroom”](#) argues that not only should students’ thoughts be made explicit, but also *how they’re thinking*. Here you’ll also find some high-level suggestions for how to approach setting aside time for metacognitive activities, as well as some ideas for how to promote deep thinking in asynchronous discussion forums.

Even if students have a good understanding of their own learning preferences, study habits, and time management, they may lack perspective on the relevance of and connections between the materials you assign. [“Providing Context: Review, Preview, Motivate”](#) provides a model for “context statements” that can help students build knowledge structures that will house the information they’re supposed to learn into a coherent big picture. You’ll also learn about chunking and expert blind spot, two phenomena that can strongly affect students’ ability to learn effectively – and your ability to teach effectively.

The primary recommendation that emerges from research on metacognition suggests that students need explicit opportunities to reflect, and though there are numerous tools at your disposal, [“E-Portfolios and Their Uses in Higher Education”](#) discusses one possible approach. The article describes what E-Portfolios are and how they can assist with metacognition both inside and outside the classroom.

Adobe Connect Tips
