Workshop Summary

Budgeting time to create a high-quality, instructionally aligned course can be challenging given all the competing demands on an online faculty member's time. In this session, participants will encounter a scalable process informed by research-based best practices for designing their online course using measurable objectives that align with thoughtfully-selected assessments and instructional materials. By the end of the workshop, participants will develop the start of their own course map and have the opportunity to discuss strategies and challenges with their peers.

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Creating a course map for your online course involves several steps. The page on [“Course Mapping”](#) contains a video that walks you through the overall process and logic behind putting together a course map. Note that there are links here to course map templates (both Word and Excel versions) that you can use to develop your own!

The rest of the pre-work materials focuses on three basic components of course design: learning objectives, assessments, and instructional materials. [“Learning Objectives Basics”](#) dives into how to articulate effective goals for your course (the first step in course design), and includes some ideas on how to troubleshoot them, should you run into problems. The article also makes the distinction between “macro objectives” and “micro objectives”: these are ways we suggest faculty distinguish between high-level goals and component skills in the service of the broader macro objectives.

The next step in a backwards design approach to course design is to articulate assessments, which allow students to demonstrate their progress towards your objectives. [“Basics of Online Assessment”](#) refreshes you on the basic dichotomy of summative and formative assessments. The principle of alignment is also addressed and will be a theme throughout the live session.

Your instructional materials prepare students for your assessments and form the real “meat” of your course. While there’s obviously a plethora of topics to discuss when it comes to instructional materials, [“Instructional Materials”](#) covers considerations when designing your own, such as copyright compliance, accessibility, and professionalism.

The last step in designing your course map involves grafting a modular structure onto the components you’ve already identified. It’s important not to underestimate the value that your modules bring to your course, both with respect to highlighting narrative structure and creating predictability and accountability for your students. [“Modular Course Design”](#) offers you the opportunity to watch a video or, if you prefer, read an article about the basics.
